## 1.2 The focus of this evaluation

One recommendation after our Whole School Evaluation from our inspector was to *focus on Irish*- Improving oral Irish using the communicative approach. See below

"Ba chóir do mhúinteoirían cur chuige cumarsáideach a chur i bhfeidhm chun deiseannaa thabhairt do na daltaí an Ghaeilge ó bhéal a úsáid agus chun torthaí foghlama na ndaltaí a fheabhsú.Teachers should implement the communicative approach to give pupils opportunities to use oral Irish and to improve pupils' learning outcomes.."

## 2. Findings

Attitudes and application needs to improve this year with 30% of children saying that do not like speaking or learning Irish.

Confidence in speaking Irish needs to be built. 3 out of 12 children confident in speaking Irish (from Focus group).

Fun opportunity and whole school engagement needs to be a priority from the beginning of the year.

Support and help from outside agencies would help leaders to bring Irish to the students.

Sorting or resources and books.

Sharing of resources e.g. poetry and dramaíocht books.

We focused on oral language gaeilge for the purposes of this section


- Irish policy and scheme is liked by all teachers. New editions in juniors to 4<sup>th</sup> class.
